

Rules and Regulations in Stock

Fewer hard and fast rules are laid down for "stock" car racing than for any other sport. Apart from starting, the only stipulation for actual racing is that drivers must not leave their cars until the race ends. Except for obeying flag signals, nothing is barred.

Modifications must be made, though, to cars entering a meeting. All are examined before racing to ensure that they conform to the standards required.

These are :-

- 1. Official numbers, given to drivers, must be shown on both sides of the car and at the rear.
 - 2. Normal bumper bars must be removed.
- Silencers must be removed and exhaust pipes must extend outside the body of the car.
 - 4. A safety-glass windshield must be fitted and all other glass removed.
 - 5. All doors must be welded or strapped shut.
- 6. Seats and upholstery must be removed and a bucket seat welded or bolted in position.
 - 7. Steel roll bars and bracing must be fitted.
 - 8. All cars to be fitted with hard-top roofs.
 - 9. Wheelbase must be standard.
 - 10. Drivers must wear crash helmets and be strapped into their seats.
- 11. All cars to be fitted with front and rear bumpers to specified design with grille on the front.
- 12. Wheels must be standard. Tyres may be of any make but must be in reasonable condition.
 - 13. No spare wheel or equipment must be carried during racing.
- 14. Drivers must be equipped in overalls, must not smoke during racing and must not leave their cars until the race ends.
 - 15. Superchargers are prohibited.
- 16. Each car must be fitted with a self-starter in working order and must leave the pits and starting line under its own power.
 - 17. Petrol tanks must be fitted inside the car.
 - 18. Brakes to be in good working order.



WHAT IS THIS STOCK CAR RACING?

As probably many of our patrons here to-night have never seen Stock Car Racing before and quite a few possibly have no idea of what it is all about, a short explanation of this new sport seems the best introduction to our first meeting at this stadium.

Stock Car Racing started in America where a group of young people keen on car racing but unable to afford the expense normally involved, decided to organise competitions with any old car and no holds barred. This idea found immediate appeal and spread all over the States but did not arrive in Europe until after the war when U.S. troops staged meetings in France, Belgium and Germany, and it

settled down as a regular feature at the Buffalo Stadium outside Paris.

Stock Car Racing arrived in England this year and has created a sensation wherever it has been put on. The tracks used in this country are usually those used for Speedway racing and have shale or some similar surface, with a special fence erected inside the ordinary speedway safety fence. This fence consists of heavy steel uprights, seven foot lengths of railway line in our case, sunk in one ton of concrete at intervals of twenty feet. These uprights are padded with old tyres to reduce the impact when the cars hit them, and through them is threaded over a mile of special steel hawser in four strands, the hawser being held taut by screw strainers. On the inside of the track a row of spaced-out empty oil drums do something to keep the cars roughly to the track and the centre flag pole and officials are rather hopefully protected by straw bales.

The cars used are usually of the all-steel saloon type, stripped of all trimmings and glass and reinforced at the sides and over the roof. The driver's seat is welded to the floor and he has to secure himself in with a quick-release safety belt and wear a crash helmet. There is one golden rule of Stock Car Racing, whatever

happens, the driver should stay in his car until the race has stopped.

The preparation of the car, the type of crash bar used and any modifications he may care to do to the engine, etc., are left to the ingenuity of the individual, the

list of essentials is given elsewhere in this programme.

A race is made up of any number of cars, usually from ten to twenty-five, lined up in accordance with the positions they have drawn and moving off to a rolling start over a course of fifteen or twenty laps. Once started there are no rules and competitors may drive where they like, how they like and in any direction they like, except to complete a lap they must go round both end poles and across the finishing line in a left-handed direction.

Bumping, boring, pushing and deliberate obstruction are all part of the game, and although it may look sheer brute force and luck will decide the winner, there is, in fact a considerable degree of skill involved and to be successful requires very

exact judgment and quick thinking.






