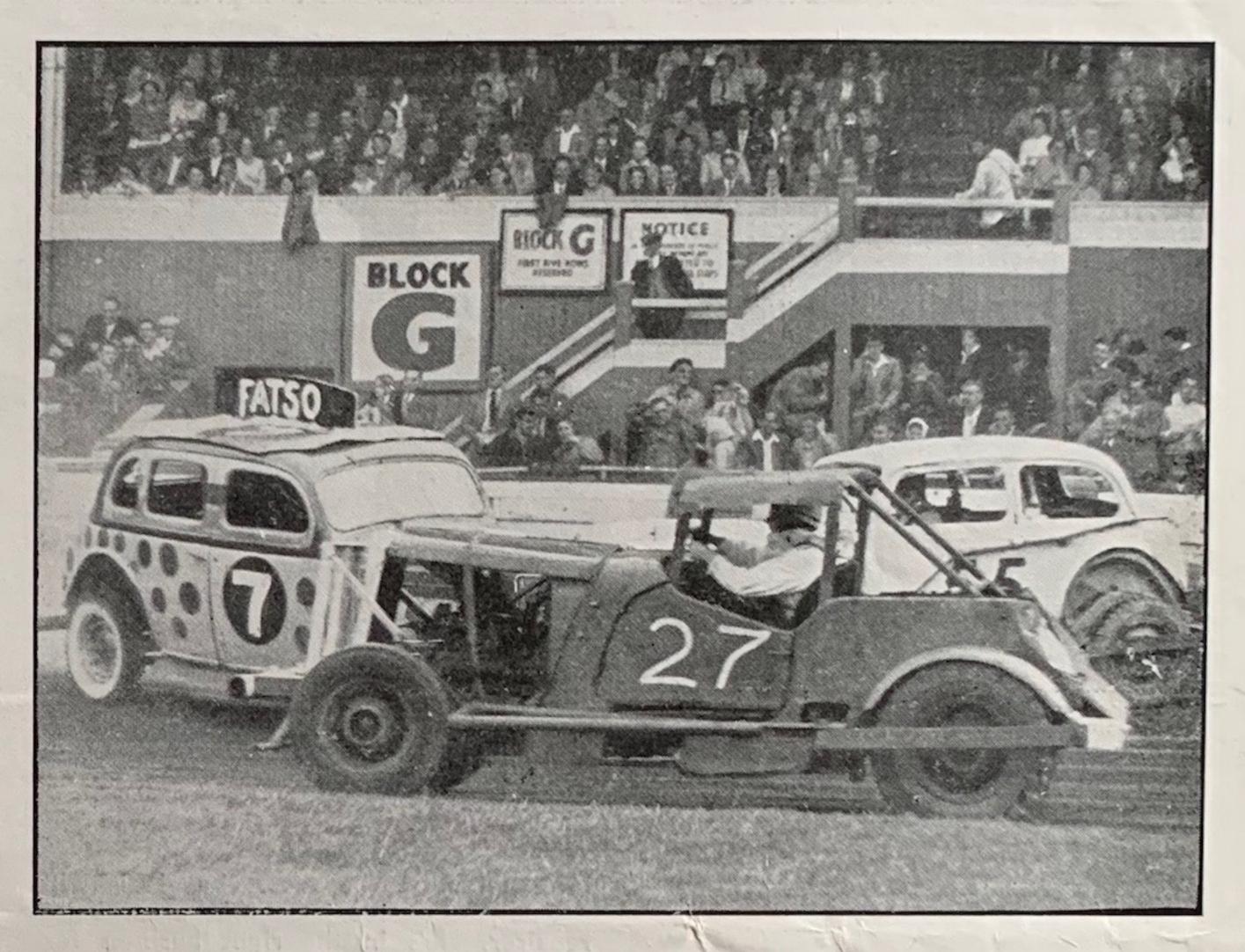
racing and particularly our fans, friends, and good fellows of the stock car fraternity.

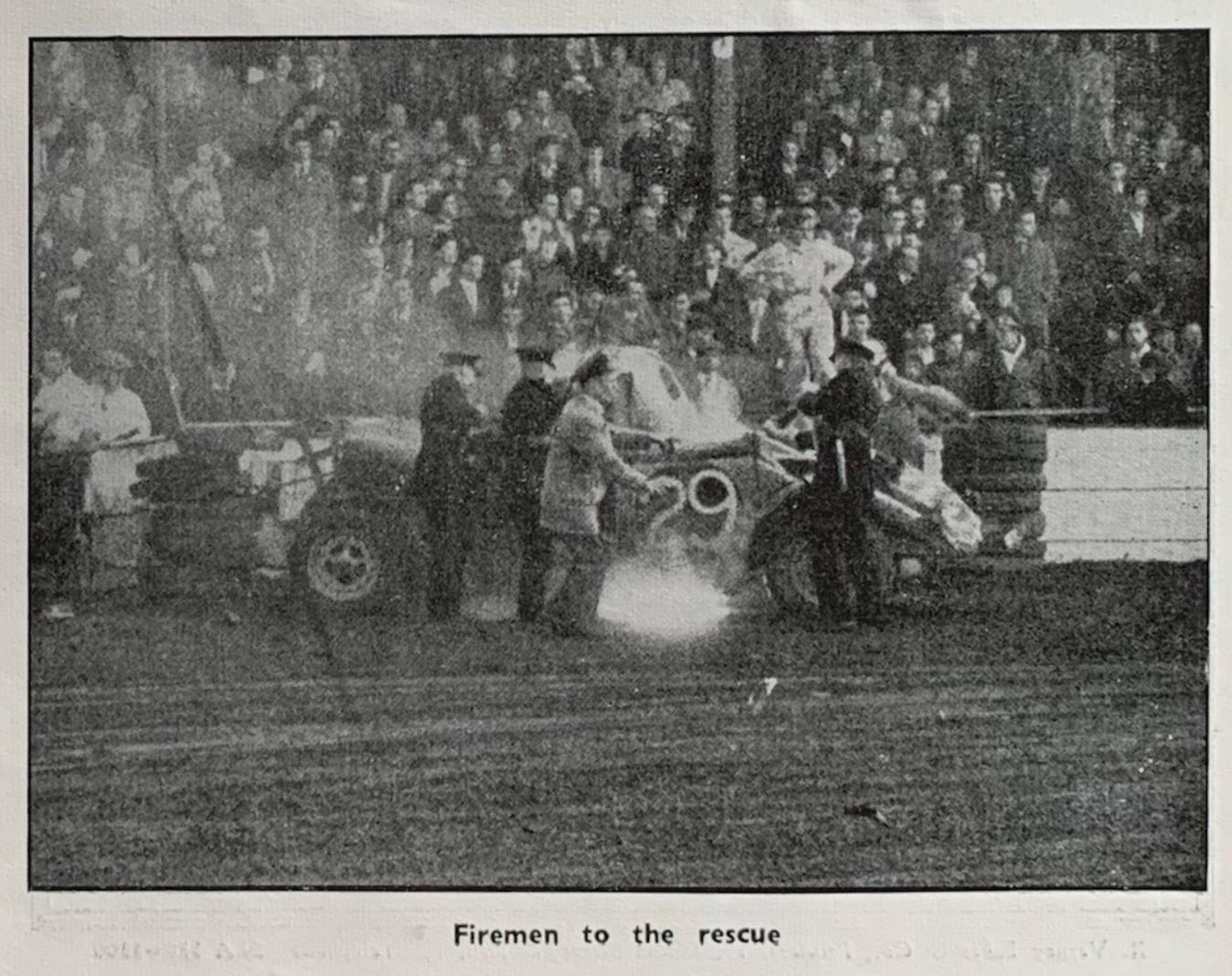

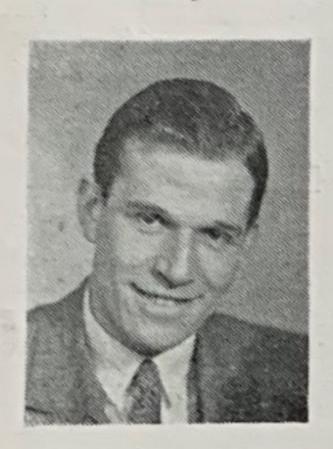

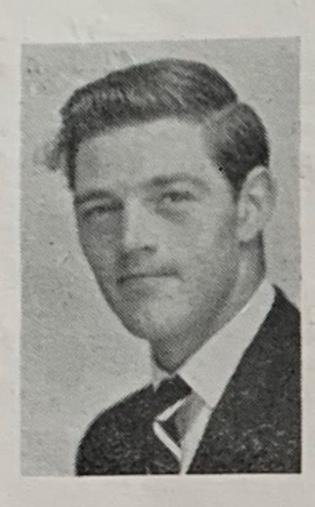

STOCK RULES SIMPLIFIED

All car bodies must have hard tops; Four-wheel drive is barred; Super-chargers are not permissible.

Safety belts must be substantially secured and of strong material and quick release; Helmets of R.A.C. design are compulsory.

All cars must have fuel shut-off within easy reach of driver; All doors must be securely bolted, welded or strapped shut; Seats and upholstery must be removed and bucket seat installed.

Crash bars must not extend beyond the outside edge of wheels; Crash bars must be rounded at ends.

Inside steel bracing and re-enforcing is compulsory.

Fuel must be in a special container inside the car and securely fastened down.

Not more than one person allowed in car during racing or practice.

Drivers may be penalised up to one lap for unnecessarily cutting across the track or gaining an advantage by leaving the track to pass an opponent.

A flickering red light means danger, slow down. Cars must keep positions and slow down until the green light or flag gives signal to go; Red flag and light means stop; Yellow flag, caution; Black flag, disqualification; Chequered flag, end of race.

When the chequered flag drops all drivers do one more lap. The red light then goes on and all drivers, except winner, who does a lap of honour, must stop and then leave track.
